2. General Description

This course is an upper-division **seminar in East Asian history**, with a focus on (1) understanding the region's **cultures and histories**, and (2) placing the history of East Asia within a **world history context**.

3. Course Content

This is a **reading-intensive**, **discussion-based** seminar for juniors, seniors, and graduate students. It is assumed that you have either a substantial background in (1) history (it need not be in Asian history) and/or (2) Asian studies.

Rather than focusing primarily on the histories of terrestrial nation-states, we will spend more time examining topics and spaces including marginal territories; flows of people, goods, and ideas; and globalization, past and present.
